


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Seek My Face Speak My Name: A Contemporary Jewish Theology

One of the most influential Jewish thinkers of our time, Green has created a roadmap of meaning for our lives in the light of Jewish mysticism, using the Hebrew letters that make up the divine name: Yodâ "Reality at the beginning. God as the oneness of being at the outset, before it unfolds into our universe. Hehâ "Creation and Godâ™s presence in the world. A renewed faith in God as Creator has powerful implications for us today. Vavâ "Revelation, the central faith claim of Judaism and the claim it makes on our lives. Hehâ "Redemption and our return to God through the life of Torah and by participating in the ongoing repair of the world. A personal and honest framework of understanding for the seeker, this revised and updated edition of a classic sheds new light on our search for the divine presence in our everyday lives.

Arthur Green is Philip W. Lown Professor of Jewish Thought at Brandeis University and dean of the Rabbinical School at Bostonâ™s Hebrew College. He is former president of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. He is a rabbi, a historian of Jewish mysticism, and a theologian. His works include *Tormented Master: The Life and Spiritual Quest of Rabbi Nahman of Bratslav*; *Keter: The Crown of God in Early Jewish Mysticism*; *The Language of Truth: Teachings from the Sefat Emet*;

These Are the Words: A Vocabulary of Jewish Spiritual Life; and Ehyeh: A Kabbalah for Tomorrow.

He is also co-editor of Your Word Is Fire: The Hasidic Masters on Contemplative Prayer.

I tried to give this book a good chance and carefully read the beginning chapters, but was disappointed and felt that the author was not clear in explaining his ideas. Green is very knowledgeable. I read other essays and books he wrote that were more coherent. Jewish mystical theology needs a foundation that this book lacked. I would not recommend this book.

Arthur Green is one of my favorite leaders in Kabalah. His books are based on traditional mysticism, not a New Age Quick Fix Self-Help type of Judaism. I found this book appealing because each chapter is very short, dealing with one, simple idea that is not dependent on previous chapters. It's a great book to read at bedtime; a brief essay, written clearly that opens your mind to many "ah-ha" moments. Great choice for all levels interested in Kabalah.

There is something to talk about on every page. Then you realize that there is even more to delve into under the surface. Highly recommended.
