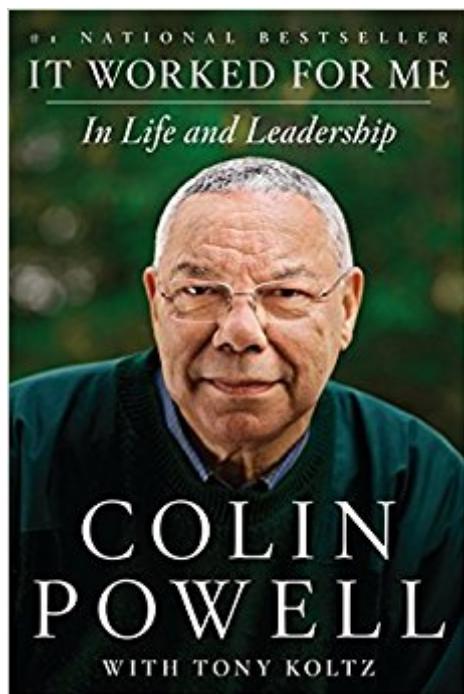

A Note from Colin Powell on *It Worked for Me* I love stories. In the course of my career I gathered a number of them that mean a lot to me. Most come from my military life. I was in the military from age seventeen as an ROTC cadet until I was a retired GI at age fifty-six. Others came from my service as Secretary of State and as National Security Advisor. Yet others came to me as I wandered through life. In this book I want to share with you a selection of these stories as well as experiences that have stayed with me over the years. Each one of them taught me something important about life and leadership. Some of the stories deal with serious aspects of my life, including some of the controversial issues I was involved in during my tenure as Secretary of State. There are also humorous stories from my life as well. I offer them to you for whatever use you may wish to make of them. The first part of *It Worked for Me* explains my Thirteen Rules, which have been bouncing

around since they were first published in Magazine over twenty years ago. These are rules that I have gathered over the years and to which I've adhered in my career. CLP's Thirteen Rules: It ain't as bad as you think. It will look better in the morning. Get mad, then get over it. Avoid having your ego so close to your position that when your position falls, your ego goes with it. It can be done! Be careful what you choose. You may get it. Don't let adverse facts stand in the way of a good decision. You can't make someone else's choices. You shouldn't let someone else make yours. Check small things. Share credit. Remain calm. Be kind. Have a vision. Be demanding. Don't take counsel of your fears or naysayers. Perpetual optimism is a force multiplier. The rest of the book focuses on everything from the importance of really knowing who you are and how to always be yourself to why I put an emphasis on knowing and taking care of others, especially those who are your followers. I go into my experience in the exploding digital realm that has reshaped the world and our lives. I talk about how to be a great manager and a great leader. I give no conclusions or recommendations, just my observations. The chapters are free-standing. You can read them straight through or jump in anywhere. Everyone has life lessons and stories. Our collective Vietnam War saga recklessly and foolishly spent our national treasure of lives and dollars after it became apparent that it was not a conflict we could win. It also inflicted grievous damage to the morale and fiber of our nation's military forces, men and women who were not well served by their senior military leadership who allowed them to be shackled by rules of engagement that were a bureaucrat's nightmare. Fast forward to 1990...Iraq's invasion of Kuwait set the table for another conflict far removed from Vietnam's quagmire simply because of the leadership of General Colin Powell. In his book, "*It Worked for me: in Life and Leadership*", the reader isn't regaled with complex

military theory or tactics. Rather General Powell simply lays out his personal rules of engagement when it comes to leading people, and that is simply to always put your people first. Cleary explain the problem, let them know what their part in solving the problem is, give them the tools they need, and then stand back and let them get to work. That, in a nutshell, is the message Colin Powell artfully conveys through example after example from both his military experience and his role in the political arena. An immensely readable book, it is jammed with knowledge that would benefit anybody interested in military affairs, any CEO who wants to take his company to the next level, and any politician who is sincerely interested in elevating our national dialogue above the deplorable state that it's in.
