

The Watchers And Their Ways



Synopsis

Many magickal texts have been written around the Watchers, and I am hoping to add my two cents to the discussion. Several decades ago, I worked with the Watchers. In this book, I have resurrected my notes and will bring some elements forward to reflect current information. For example, any ritual suggestion will still include old elements I used in the 80s, but I will bring it forward to reflect our latest advances, such as the ease of obtaining incense and the like. This book will be extremely heavy in historical and textual analysis. I feel the Watchers are very interesting, and I have not yet found a comprehensive text on them. Existing texts are very general, or they seem to focus on one narrative element. I will try to make my analysis of them as comprehensive as possible. The information is scattered around; I like to bring ideas together and that is what I will do here in this book. I know many just want the magick but I would be doing many and myself an injustice without at least giving the history behind things. I am also a historian so that might be part of it. This is fun for me. Here is a glimpse of what will be covered in this book. Aside from the rituals of course, we will be covering the basics of the Watchers' story as it is understood in Genesis since it is there that the first inkling of the story emerges in the scriptural tradition. I emphasize scriptural because there is evidence that some texts exist that predate Genesis that contain a proto-Watchers narrative. Some of these early stories have some connection to Ancient Mesopotamia; we will discuss that as well. We will, of course, cover the Watcher tradition in the various books of Enoch; that, I suppose, is a given. We will also discuss the Watcher tradition as it relates to texts outside the accepted canon as well.

This is the single worst book on the occult or religious history I have ever read, and I have read quite a lot. I bought this book thinking it was an exposition on the nature of the entities commonly referred to as "The Watchers" or sometimes "The Secret Chiefs" who dwell in the astral plane and have been observed by many people. However, they rarely speak nor interact which is why there is so little written about them and they remain shrouded in mystery. This book has nothing to do with them. The author is simply using the wrong word to describe demons (even more baffling: he uses the words "demon" and "angel" interchangeably). Thus, one might conclude that this is a book on Goetic Magick. In some sense it is, except that everything it says is wrong. I can say that with a great degree of confidence since I have read nearly everything ever written on the subject and have even taught classes on Goetic Magick. The other reviews confirm the fear that I had when reading this book that people who don't know any better might think that anything in this book is true. This book is not only a work of complete fiction, it is barely intelligible at all. However, I don't know if that would be so obvious to a person new to the subject matter. Many new non-fiction authors take a long time to publish their first book and then do so very reluctantly. This is because they are nervous about the depth of their own knowledge and are unsure if they've presented the material fairly and completely. This is the book every new author fears they have just produced. However, this isn't "Baal Kadmon's" first book. So it's no wonder he publishes under a pseudonym! In closing, there is no redeeming value to this book (and I've never said that about any book before). There are enough

high-quality academic and historical books available on the subject of black/demonic/Goetic magick on to teach you everything you could possibly want to know about the subject. Even ignoring the glaring inaccuracies, this book has nothing to add to the existing body of knowledge on the subject.
